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United Kingdom – COVID-19: Visa Application Centres Reopening in U.K. and Overseas

As the COVID-19 crisis in the United Kingdom appears to be abating, the U.K. government is ending the temporary closures of U.K. visa application centres in the U.K. and around the world.¹ Services are being restored in most cases. (For prior coverage, see GMS [Flash Alert 2020-182](#), 17 April 2020.)

WHY THIS MATTERS

The U.K. Visa and Citizenship Application Centres (UKVCAS) play a key role in immigration application processing and eligibility assessment. They also support fingerprinting services for some immigration applications (biometrics). Applicants who had their appointments cancelled due to centre closures will receive new appointment notices. Appointment notices will include further guidance for visiting the UKVCAS facilities.

The full list of UKVCAS centres which reopened on 1 June can be found at <https://www.gov.uk/ukvcas>. Individuals with submitted applications and booked appointments, who were not able to attend their appointment due to COVID-19, are able to start re-booking appointments from 1 June.

Those who had no prior appointments will likely have to continue to wait to get things started or in order to complete any necessary biometric appointment to continue the processing of their application.

Application Centres in the U.K.

After closures due to COVID-19, some UKVCAS have reopened for existing customers (i.e., applicants who had already booked an appointment but were unable to attend due to COVID-19) on 1 June 2020.

For individuals with appointments at centres which have not reopened on 1 June, the Home Office will have been in contact to confirm the further postponement of the appointment. Individuals' immigration status is unaffected by the inability to attend an appointment.

Individuals who had not previously booked an appointment, are not yet able to schedule new appointments.

Application Centres Overseas

For individuals outside the U.K., some U.K. Visa Application Centres (VACs) are also resuming services. Where services are resuming, those with existing appointments will be contacted.

Where the VAC remains closed, British nationals in those countries will be unable to apply for a British passport, although if travel is urgently required, then it may be possible to obtain an emergency travel document⁴.

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Where an individual's 30-day entry visa to travel to the U.K. for work, study, or to join family has expired, or is about to expire, it is now possible to request a replacement visa with revised validity dates free of charge until the end of this year (2020). Requests should be made to the Coronavirus Immigration Help Centre⁵. An individual will not face any penalties for being unable to collect their Biometric Residence Permit while coronavirus measures are in effect. This process will remain in place until the end of 2020.

KPMG NOTE

The re-opening of centres is not yet helping those who did not have pre-booked appointments, or new applicants who are hoping to move ahead with their immigration and citizenship matters.

Overall, employers and individual applicants should continue to expect delays in processing of all visa applications.
